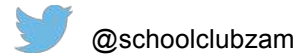




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Why Start A School Enterprise?

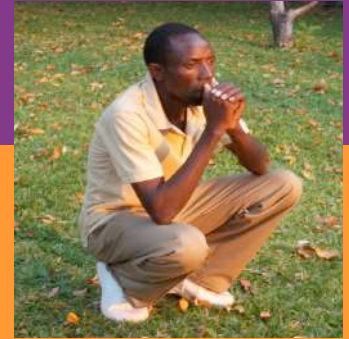
'The garden is close to my house so my family can buy vegetables'.
